Abstract

The program is designed to assist young school leavers access appropriate employment and community services of their choice. THE POST SCHOOL OPTIONS PROGRAM UPDATE

The Post School Option (PSO) Program has embarked on assessing the needs of 1993 school leavers with disabilities. Letters to families have been sent through the Principals of Ministry of Education, Catholic, Independent and Anglican schools.

Post School Options Workshops have been scheduled in six different locations in the metropolitan regions in February to inform families and teachers of 1993 school leavers with disabilities prior to the Individual Assessments. Families stated feeling encouraged by the stories and experiences shared by school leavers who are currently participating in the PSO program in an employment or community access/ recreation option. They appreciated the availability of supports, individualised options and family involvement in determining the option. The workshop presentation included an introduction to the Post School Options program, eligibility criteria, service priority, planning process, application, description of options and historical perspective. Parents were anxious for continued funding to the program as it would directly impact on their daughter/ son's post school option and their family in 1994.

A Project Officer has been employed to carry out Individual PSO Assessment with school leavers with disabilities in conjunction with their families and teachers in the metropolitan regions while Divisional Co-ordinators will assist with school leavers in country regions. This is an attempt to reduce the confusion that resulted from multiple contact people last year. However Local Area Co-ordinators and Regional Contact people have requested to be involved in the PSO individual Assessments when the school leaver is registered with AIH.

The Post School Options Working Party have recently confirmed the policies that relate to the Post School Options Program namely:

- . Eligibility criteria
- . Service priority
- . PSO Individual Assessment
- . Planning Process

- . Summary of 1992 school leavers funded through PSO.
- List of post school options and occupational settings.

The Post School Options Working Party and funding organisations have recently approved plans for a comprehensive evaluation of the program. The evaluation will be overseen by an Evaluation Steering Committee representing key stakeholders and the Brief for the evaluation is currently being finalised. Further information outlining the evaluation process will be available in the near future.

ANTICIPATED 1993 SCHOOL LEAVERS:

More parents of students with disabilitites are aware and interested in the Post School Options (PSO) Program. Consequently we anticipate an increase in applicants for the program in 1994.

However from 6 schools in 1991, there are now 60 school that are offering Post Compulsary Schooling for student with disabilities. Consequently more students with disabilities will continue to year 11 and 12. As a result we anticipate less students leaving school and requiring the PSO Program. Hence the number of applicants this year may remain constant (175) or increase by about 20.

POST SCHOOL OPTIONS PROGRAM **EVALUATION BRIEF**

INTRODUCTION

The Post School Options (PSO) Program was initiated in 1990 to assist young school leavers, with a disability, access appropriate employment and community services of their choice. The program is individualised, matching school leavers with support agencies at or around the time when they are required to leave the education system (i.e. approximately 18 years of age).

Since its inception, the program has assisted 417 young people to link with 19 new or expanded services. Options include competitive open employment, supported open employment and various forms of community access support where employment is neither feasible nor desirable for the individual.

The PSO is a Western Australian initiative, funded by the State and Commonwealth Governments, which aims to focus the efforts of key departments, funding agencies and support services in the achievement of positive outcomes. The target group are otherwise at risk of total reliance on family or entry into segregated traditional forms of support such as sheltered workshops, activity therapy centres or day centres. There are also long waiting lists for existing employment and recreation services and in the main these tend to be segregated activities.

Co-ordination of the program is the responsibility of AIH with the support of three committees;

Post School Options Working Party with representation from the Association of Competitive Employment, Ministry of Education, Lotteries Commission of WA, Department for Health, Housing and Community Services (DHH&CS), Authority for Intellectually Handicapped Persons (AIH), and consumers.

Funding Committee with representation from the Lotteries Commission of WA,

DHH&CS, and AIH.

Education Committee with representation from education support consultants from the Ministry of Education, Catholic Schools Commission, Independent and Anglican Schools Commission.

The PSO program has been developmental in its approach and currently it aims to:

involve school leavers with disabilities and their families in designing their own programs and activities;

provide individualised post school options for students with disabilities;

encourage the participation and acceptance of young people with disabilities within the local community; and

integrate transition and post school programs.

Eligible participants in the program are those school leavers with a permanent disability who:

are required to leave school;

are in receipt of the Child Disability Allowance and/or are eligible for the Disability Support Pension; and

require specialist assistance to secure and maintain employment or recreation opportunities.

AIH has appointed a full-time Co-ordinator to co-ordinate activities such as the identification of students, needs assessments, liaison with families, schools, service and funding agencies. AIH country divisional and district co-ordinators undertake individual needs analysis for country school leavers. The Co-ordinator also liaises with new and existing agencies regarding their growth plans and initiates the development of new services to meet PSO needs in the required local areas.

Planning begins in January/February of each year with student information being accumulated on a school by school basis. By mid-May needs assessment near completion facilitating a regional assessment of the needs of different service options. Advertisements seeking expressions of interest from agencies are placed in April with a view to establishing the linkage between students and services by September/October so that agencies can commence personal planning with students prior to the end of the school year.

PURPOSE OF THE EVALUATION

The project will evaluate the appropriateness, effectiveness and efficiency of the Post School Options Program in relation to:

- the effectiveness of the overall program in meeting the identified needs of school
- the satisfaction of school leavers and their families with outcomes, program processes and service delivery; and
- the appropriateness and efficiency of the funding process.

Key questions to be addressed are included in the appendix to this brief.

BOUNDARIES

The program has been operating for three years and information from each of these years will be critical to the effectiveness of the evaluation. Input from all stakeholders involved including funding agencies will be sought.

METHODOLOGY

It is expected that the methodology will include a focus on:

- the context for the program and its administration. This will include an environmental scan, a literature review and review of previous research including the report of the Mayer Committee, the Carmichael Report, and AIH policy documents;
- the services funded through PSO and outcomes achieved. This will also examine the linkages with departments and agencies, interviews and stakeholders, including the Ministry of Education, service agencies and AIH; and
- the satisfaction of school leavers and families with outcomes including their views on program process and service delivery.

REPORTING

A draft report will be prepared and circulated to the Steering Committee by July 1993, with a final report due by August 1993.

The final report will provide the following information to the Evaluation Steering Committee:

description of program;

description of participating school leavers and analysis of outcomes;

. description and analysis of services;

issues to be addressed including policy directions, resourcing implications, co-ordination of the program;

recommendations for the future of the program.

PROJECT MANAGEMENT AND SUPPORT

The project will be managed by a Steering Committee who will meet as required during the period of the project (approximately 4 weekly). The A/Manager Performance Monitoring and Evaluation (AIH), in consultation with the Chairman, Evaluation Steering committee, will be responsible for day-to-day management of the consultant(s) and will meet with the consultant(s) as required to facilitate a successful project outcome.

Project support will be available by negotiation through AIH's Evaluation Branch. Data on participating school leavers is already being gathered and analysed.
