PARENT ADVOCACY

PARENT ADVOCACY IS:

- : Supporting parents and encouraging them to be independent rather than dependent on an advocate.
- : A partnership sharing of knowledge and skills
- : Assisting parents to identify a problem, and ways to go about solving it
- : Assisting parents to develop strategies and negotiation skills.
- : Linking parents with appropriate support services and regional personnel
- : Networking with other disability groups, parent organisations and support groups.

PARENT ADVOCACY IS NOT:

- : Legal advocacy
- : Making decisions for parents
- : Doing all the talking
- : Making them dependent

Parent advocacy in this context, is advocacy by groups of parents, it is group advocacy or issue advocacy, by parents.

Naturally, parents do a lot of advocacy for themselves and their children - all parents have to do this - the difference when the child has a disability is largely one of degree, given the special difficulties and needs and the lack of resources with which they may be addressed.

Other parents see that strength lies in numbers, that groups may be able to effect change where individuals cannot.

Some things parent advocacy groups can do are:

- Lobby governments
- Write submissions
- Represent parents on inter-departmental consultancy committees
- They sometimes conduct or become embroiled in media campaigns.
